



Oct 28 – **Outrage** (2009). “Don’t ask, don’t tell” has a double meaning in DC. This bold scrutiny of secretly gay policymakers who push anti-gay legislation, explores the ethics of outing closeted politicians; power and compromise; the complicity of government staffers, operatives and the media in cover-ups; and homophobic actions which harm millions of gay people worldwide.




Nov 11 – **The Cove** (2009). This Oscar documentary winner has drawn global attention to the hunting and killing of dolphins in Japan, using secretly-shot footage. It investigates mercury poisoning and issues behind the abuse of animals - e.g. greed and indifferent governance. Hard to watch, controversial, it underlines the need to curtail animal abuse in food factories, labs and zoos.



Nov 25 – **The Most Dangerous Man in America – Daniel Ellsberg and the Pentagon Papers** (2009). Wikileaks’ whistleblowing is under attack by the Pentagon for its publication of Iraq war files. Déjà vu? Yes! This inspiring film highlights how a courageous activist earlier rocked the Pentagon in his exposé of the Vietnam war cover-up. Join us for a Thanksgiving Day eve together!




Dec 9 – **Crude** (2009). In 1993, a lawsuit on behalf of Ecuador was filed against Texaco for \$27bn when an oil spill contaminated its water and land. The film presents the continuing case from multiple viewpoints: corporate power, indigenous rights, international business, environmental impact, the cost of oil addiction and the difficulty to make industry account for errors.




Feb 3 – **Come Un Uomo Sulla Terra** (2008). In 2006, Ethiopian law student Dag Yimer, fled Ethiopia for a better life in Rome. Joined with the stories of other African immigrants, this moving film documents their struggles to reach Italian shores via Libya. It brings to light the brutal life in Libyan detention centers and the international policies that sustain them. (Italian w/English subtitles)



Feb 17 – **Burma VJ** (2009). Using small handycams, young video journalists (VJs) record and broadcast the grief that Burmese people are experiencing under militaristic government rule. This documentary on brave, high-risk journalism includes smuggled footage of the 2007 massive, but peaceful uprising led by monks against the regime. Foreign press is banned but VJs keep on filming!

By metro: Take the B line to the Garbatella stop, exit towards Via Pullino, turn right and continue across Piazza Albini to Arcobaleno (200mt).
